Restorative Nursing Rehab and restorative nursing are complements to one another, but not the same Rehab therapy is based on a medical model Requires fast-paced and significant progress in a short period of time Restorative nursing is based on a nursing model Focuses on maintaining function in a long-term, ongoing process
